
Rain was so heavy that the water entered the entire village. Some bears climbed the trees while others ran here and there for shelter.

In Chile, experiments are on to promote production of a special species of owls, called 'white wild owl'. According to a report of 'Santiago Times', the feed of these owls is the mouses carrying a peculiar deadly virus, leading to contiguous viral infection which has already claimed 15 human lives.

The long-tailed tiny mouses, found mostly in grassy areas like forests, are responsible to spread this deadly virus in human bodies. This normally happens when these mouses, in search of their food, happen to come in contact with people either residing or are on vacation in these forests. Further, in their efforts to escape from wild fire caused during hot months of summer in Chile, these mouses move towards urban areas, resulting people getting infected by this virus. These mouses, however, remain unaffected by this virus.

It could cause fire and burst the cylinder; the whole house could catch fire.

'Really, I didn't know', said the leopard aunty. 'Good you told me. Similar incident happened a month back in my uncle's house. He lit a match box while the gas was leaking, resulting fire in the house and deep burns on his body'.

Tinu said that we could avoid accidents by taking precautionary measures and save our lives. If we carefully use these modern gadgets with sufficient preliminary knowledge, these can become our friends instead.



I would teach everyone about appropriate steps and precautions necessary for use of the gas so as to avoid any untoward incidents. Tinu, you should tell me as to what other safety steps should I take now to stop gas leakage in my house. Tinu advised the aunty to:

★ First of all, open all the doors and windows of the house.

★ Do not lit any match box or candle.

★ Close the regulator and put on the safety





\* Close the knob and dial emergency number of your distributor. These numbers are printed on the receipts provided for gas deliveries.

★ In case it turns out to be a case of fire leakage, dial immediately 101.

Leopard aunty did accordingly; opened all the doors and windows; took action on all the tips and then phoned the distributor. The distributor immediately replaced the cylinder and asked for aunt's pardon for the leakage. He advised her that the cylinder should be checked regularly; use a quality tube of 1.5 meter length. The tube should be protected from heat and fire. There should be no cover on the gas pipe and should be cleaned by a wet cloth from time to time. It should be changed after its use of one year.

Leopard aunty asked Tinu about any further precaution so that I tell about every precaution to everyone in the village. Tinu said that there are a few more precautions, such as:


- \* Knob should be put off after use of gas
- ★ The cylinder should not be hit in any manner
- \* Fitting of tube on cylinder should be regularly checked
- ★ one should wear cotton cloths while using kitchen
- \* Plastic objects should be kept away from the cylinder
- ★ Get attentive in case there is a smell of gas
- \* Regulator should be turned off.



#### Remembering Vivek Shauq

#### IT IS A BLISS

For the world, Vivek Shauq was an Indian actor, comedian, writer and poet, who succumbed to a heart attack. For those



who knew him, he was a spiritual being who inspired and touched people's lives. There was much to learn from him.

Shortly after Vivek Ji's passing on, I went back and listened to one of his last talks, given at a spiritual gathering. I'm so glad I did because his words were life changing. He explained some key concepts. The phrase 'prabhu ki kirpa' in Hindi can be translated as God's blessings. Indeed everything is God's blessings.

However, Vivek Ji took a step further and clarified that as human beings we should never try to define God's blessings. He gave the example of a father, who, one day says, with God's blessing, my three sons failed their exams. People laughed at him and looked at him strangely. But he went on to explain, if it is God's blessings when they pass exams, then why is it not God's blessings when they fail? The father was on to something. Why is it that only the acknowledgment of passing grades or the promotions at work fall into the category of God's blessings? Why is it God's blessings when everything goes our way? Should we not ponder over this?

It is important to realize that believing in God is to accept that He is managing the entire cosmos and that He loves us. This belief also means that everything that happens is not only His will, but also His Blessings. Whatever is happening is God's blessing. And equally, whatever is not

happening, is also God's blessing.

If something doesn't seem right to us in our limited human capacity to understand the Omniscient, even then we need to accept the view that there is a reason behind everything.

This was a new concept for me. I always believed everything happening is God's will. But Vivek Ji showed me that it is not only His will, it is also His blessing! And if we can walk with that simple realization, every step will be taken in peace.

The only thing that we have to do is - surrender. If something is not happening despite our best efforts, that is His blessings as well. Sometimes 'mera kuch karna hi kabni kabhi rukawat ban jata hai'. In other words, sometimes we try so hard to go for something that is not His will, and we ourselves become the cause of delays and/or roadblocks.

Word has it that perhaps the greatest cricketer of all time, Sachin Tendulkar, failed his 10th standard examinations. But now, in one state in India, one of the lessons taught in the 10th class is about the living legend, the 'little master' himself.

Blessings come in different forms and different guises. He may not have done well in 10th grade, but Tendulkar is a success, God had a special plan for him. That is not to say, we approach life with a 'given up mentality'. No, we must be proactive and strive not only to work hard, but also fulfill our responsibilities and spread love everywhere we go for as long as we are in this world.
